The Human Rights Commission (HRC) stands for the universal commitment to safeguard dignity, equality and justice for all people. It was established in 2006, and since then HRC has been the UN's primary body dedicated to the promotion and protection of human rights, responding to crises and addressing violations. It is made up of 47 Member States elected by the General Assembly and is headquartered in Geneva, Switzerland.

The HRC addresses violations, makes recommendations, and works to uphold international human rights. Its Universal Periodic Review (UPR) provides a comprehensive assessment of each country's human rights record. The commission also contributes to the development of long term international standards that strengthen the protection and promotion of human rights for current and future generations.

This year's AMMUN theme "Deliberate to Liberate" reflects the purpose of the HRC. Deliberation is more than just debate, it is a tool to challenge injustice, build agreements, and craft resolutions that can meaningfully contribute to the liberation of individuals and communities facing oppression. Delegates are going to consider how careful dialogue, and cooperation can create practical solutions that defend rights and empower societies.

As participants in AMMUN which is a THIMUN affiliated conference, there is high expectations. Delegates of the HRC are expected to arrive prepared and ready to engage in respectful yet meaningful discussions. Delegates are expected to research the topics beforehand and read the research reports. Moreover, delegates are expected to research their delegation's foreign policies and stance on each of the topics before the conference in order to be well prepared. We expect every participant to maintain respectful and parliamentary tones throughout the conference. The chairing panel will assist all delegates throughout the conference and provide guidance to allow everyone to participation equally and engage in meaningful discussions.
